1. Introduction

The purpose of this course is to help students understand the nature of Chinese foreign policies and its foreign relations. There is no prerequisite to take, but only eagerness to study, learn, and participate in this course. To achieve this goal, this course provides an introduction of key theories, concepts, and issues in Chinese foreign policies and international relations.

There are typically 3-4 sub-chapters of reading per lecture and presentation. Students taking this course agree to come to class prepared to discuss every week, and will participate in the class discussion actively. Otherwise, it will be hard to catch up.

2. Course Objectives

Key objectives of this course are to develop skills in analyzing and explaining Chinese foreign policies and China's international relations. and to acquire such knowledge and skills for drawing policy implications such as in bilateral and multilateral relations.

This course also examines some of the major theoretical perspectives for studying policy-making process and how states and peoples behave and interact. Students will learn new ways of thinking in Chinese foreign and security policies, increase their ability to evaluate competing ideas, and apply different perspectives for concrete policy issues.

3. Class types and activities

Everyweek, 3–4 students need to read a book designated in the syllabus and make a presentation with written paper. The other students but the presenters need to join discussion.
